Hadassah members and friends will hear a talk on one of Hadassah's major projects in Israel by Dr. Shmuel Katz of Hadassah University Hospital in Jerusalem at 11:30 a.m., Wednesday, March 16.

Dr. Katz is an orthopedic pediatric surgeon and currently a Clinical and Research Fellow at Riley Hospital for Children in Indianapolis. Born in Tel Aviv, he completed his medical training, internship and residency in pediatric surgery at Hebrew University — Hadassah Medical School and Hospital in Jerusalem. He has been a Research Fellow at the Weizmann Institute of Science, and has completed a Clinical

Fellowship in Pediatric Surgery at Children's Hospital of Ohio State University. He will tell about innovations for which Hadassah Hospitals in Israel have become renowned.

When Israelis Leave Lebanon

"The Lebanese are not our enemies. Israel wants to leave Lebanon to the Lebanese, clear of the PLO and Syrians. Once an agreement is reached," said Col. Zeev Livne, one of the two Israeli officers who came to IUPUI to talk to the students about the situation in Lebanon, "then you (Americans) will have the problem! Because once we pull back, you will have to put more forces in Lebanon in order to assist control by their government."

LT. COL. ARIE BEN-KISH, an eighth generation Israeli, is on a 10-day lecture tour here along with Col. Livne, who is presently studying at Fort Leavenworth. Jointly they shared information with the students. Ben-Kish said: "Here

they really don't know the nature of our problem. Sometimes the media is not fair to Israel. At times TV and radio shows only present the black pictures."

Lt. Col. Ben-Kish brought up two examples.

He said that the American media never mentioned incidents, two of which, he encountered as an officer during the Lebanese operation. As the Israeli army progressed, his unit came close to a small Lebanese village. The villagers were shooting at the Israeli soldiers. Unexpectedly the barrage stopped and a village elder came toward the Israelis with a request. A young woman of 20, he said, the wife of a village leader, is about to give birth. Could somebody

Marriage Reaffirmation Service Set At Beth-El

A marriage reaffirmation service has been arranged at Beth-El Zedeck Congregation for Friday night, April 1 when couples will recite words of revalidation and reaffirmation, and the service will be weaved around the theme of love and marriage in Jewish tradition.

Explaining the service, Rabbi Dennis Sasso wrote in the congregation's bulletin:

"The marriage reaffirmation ceremony is for any time and for any couple, for those who

may be celebrating a meaningful anniversary or those who have gone through a special moment in their lives (joyous or sad), those who may be married for a long time or for a short time, with children, without children — for any who would like to say at Passover spring time, life is meaningful and beautiful, particularly when we share it together. Please note that you need not be going through a special anniversary to participate in this ceremony."

Historian Sees Standoff Between U.S. And Russia

BLOOMINGTON — Turning to one of the students at his lecture at Indiana University, Professor Randolph L. Braham asked, "What appears in your mind when they talk of the six million?"

The girl was unable to answer.

THE HISTORIAN who described in his epic work the minute details of the tragic deportation of Hungarian Jewry to concentration camps in a book entitled *The Politics of Genocide*, continued:

"You do know the approximate distances in the United States, don't you?" The girl answered: "Yes." "Then you are able to imagine corpses laying next to each other on the highway from New York through California to Hawaii. This stretch of distance would be necessary for six million, dead, and of these a million and half were children!"

THE URBANE, well-groomed professor, around sixty, made it clear in an interview later that this subject, the history of Nazi terror, is a personal matter to him. His everyday activity by which he sustains himself, is the professorship at City College of New York. He teaches contemporary political science. When we asked for his views of the present day world politics, he said:

"We are faced with two basically satisfied nations. They can wipe out each other and the world. We have a balance of terror. Were it not for the awesome atomic weapons, chances are that World War III would have been fought and almost forgotten. But it is this weapon that prevents the settlement of international

tension by war as it would have been done in the past. So we have a common interest in preventing a nuclear war. It would be mutually devastating."

HE WENT ON: "The second possibility for peace (is) that we are basically satisfied nations and have a mutual interest not to allow the atomic club to expand. Ideology is not a good criterion for evaluating the behavior or expectations of a state. Ideology is not a good guide." Continuing, he pointed to the Soviet Union. "Do you think that Marxism guides Soviet foreign policy? Russian national interest guides Soviet policy primarily. If national interests can be reconciled, than ideology not withstanding there is a great possibility for — not convergence of the two systems — but approximation, lessening of tensions! Compare the condition of today with that which existed during the height of the cold war under the Stalinist period. Who would have thought of the possibility that over 200 thousand Jews would leave the Soviet Union. Who would have dared even to think?"

He was a former member of B'nai Torah Congregation and the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen.

Anti-Semitic Incidents Traced To Jewish Student

GENEVA — The Switzerland Jewish community here has undergone a trauma of a kind as a 23-year-old Jewish medical student was arrested in Basel for a campaign of virulent anti-Semitism which included death threats and even harassment of non-Jewish friends of Jews.

He is Philip Goetchel, son of a prominent Jewish family. Several Jewish students at the Basel Medical School received anonymous letters saying, "Death to the Jews,"

"Hitler was right" and "No more Jewish doctors in Switzerland." Slogans of the same kind were daubed on walls of local synagogues and public buildings.

As the result of the fear the campaign aroused, Swiss troops had been sent to Basel to protect the Jewish students.

Goetchel is undergoing psychiatric treatment. He was said to have been a good student.

If Resolution Passes

Reform Rabbis Set Rules For Patrilineal Descent

LOS ANGELES — The Reform rabbis meeting here are expected to approve the resolution calling for acceptance of the Jewish status of the offspring of any mixed marriage "through appropriate and timely public and formal acts of identification with the Jewish faith and Jewish People."

Whether that language will be retained in the actual resolution to be considered at the convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis here remains to be seen. It is the language in the resolution to be presented to the rabbis by the Committee On Patrilineal Descent on the Status of Children of Mixed Marriages.

Chairing the committee is Rabbi Herman Schaalman, of Chicago, president of the CCAR.

The resolution calls for the same criteria whether the mother or father is Jewish.

The resolution quoted from 1947 CCAR decision to accept children as Jewish "if the parents therefore will make a declaration to the rabbi that it is their intention to raise the child as a Jew, the child may . . . thus be considered converted." It also quoted the 1961 edition of the Reform Rabbi's Manual to the effect: "Reform Judaism . . . accepts such a child as Jewish without a formal conversion if he attends a Jewish school and follows a course of studies leading to Confirmation. Such procedure is regarded as sufficient evidence that the parents and the child himself intend that

he shall live as a Jew."

The resolution stated that "We face today an unprecedented situation due to the changed conditions in which decisions concerning the status of the child of a mixed marriage are to be made. There are tens of thousands of mixed marriages. In a vast majority of these cases the non-Jewish extended family is a functioning part of the child's world, and may be decisive in shaping the life of the child. It can no longer be assumed a priori therefore that the child of a Jewish mother will be Jewish any more than that the child of a non-Jewish mother will not be.

"This leads us to the conclusion that the same requirements must be applied to establish the status of a mixed marriage, regardless of whether the mother or the father is Jewish."

In its final paragraph the resolution lists the "mitzvot" to be followed which indicate that the child has decided to be Jewish.

"Depending on circumstances, mitzvot leading toward a positive and exclusive Jewish identity will include the covenant, acquisition of a Hebrew name, Torah study, bar/bat mitzvah and Kabbalat Torah (Confirmation). For those beyond childhood claiming Jewish identity, other public acts or declarations may be added or substituted after consultation with their rabbi."

Of the other resolutions, two of interest are on the single rabbi and his, her problems and establishment of Yom Hasho'ah as a day of solemn memorial when marriages would not be performed and public social not be held.

Knesset Votes Down Reform, Conservatism

JERUSALEM — Reform and Conservatism suffered another rebuff when the Knesset by a vote of 44-31 defeated a bill that would have given them equal rights with those of Orthodoxy. Religious Affairs Min-

ister Yosef Burg, who withdrew himself from consideration as a successor to President Navon, said that the religious pluralism in the United States cannot serve as an example for Israel.

Max Fisher Wins This One

JERUSALEM — The board of governors won a fight with Likud to name Gideon Witkon as director-general of Project Renewal. Chairman Arye Dulzin's candidate, Yitzhak Katabi, who was supported

by Likud, lost when the American members of the board of governors supported Witkon, who is a planner in the Jewish Agency Settlement Department.

Failure Of Negotiations Seen As A Severe Blow

WASHINGTON — What will happen to negotiations over withdrawal of foreign troops from Lebanon if the high level talks between Secretary of State Shultz and the Foreign Ministers of Israel and Lebanon founder was being asked in political circles.

THE KIND OF GAMBLE that talks like those that went on here is well understood by all sides. If there is no solution to the problem, then what hope is there for answers from those like Habib and others who have been negotiating for months now?

As of Monday, there was no reason to be optimistic. Israel was still insisting that it needed iron-clad guarantees, even though it has long made concessions from its first position that its own soldiers be stationed at three strategic locations in south Lebanon.

WHEN ISRAEL'S Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir emerged with no consoling word after being seated for four hours with Mr. Shultz, Sunday, it was a good sign that the deadlock not only had not been broken, but was more frozen than ever.

Shamir sought to convince Mr. Shultz that Israel could not abandon her need for security and that this was not only to Israel's best interests but also was important for the United States.

As far as open borders, Lebanon still was resisting. A **SURPRISE MOVE** by the United States was possible, but a three-way meeting instead of individual meetings of the three statesmen or even intervention by President Reagan should not be ruled out. Although these eventualities have already been knocked down by State Department spokesmen, Mr. Reagan is known to be impetuous when he is faced with situations which do not lend themselves to solutions.

President Amin Gemayel sent his Prime Minister to Washington, Saeb Salam, but evidently that move hasn't proved of value.

MEANWHILE, President Carter had concluded his Mideast trip, and in Israel while his appearance stirred up some rock throwing as he toured the West Bank, he was received cordially and entertained by

Mr. Begin, even though he criticized the Prime Minister in one of his press interviews for abandoning the Camp David peace accords.

Another U.S. official also was in Israel, Jeanne J. Kirkpatrick, the U.S. delegate to the United Nations. She attended the Conference on Soviet Jewry.

FOR WHAT may have been the first time, Mr. Shultz met with the Jewish members of the House of Representatives as a group at the instance of Rep. James H. Scheuer. Twenty-five of the 29 Jewish House members attended the informal buffet dinner followed by a discussion of Mr. Reagan's policies in the Middle East.

Another bone of contention between Israel and the United States was also far from a solution. It involves the captured Soviet armaments that Israel in the past has turned over to the United States with understandings that served both sides after U.S. experts had analyzed the equipment and made comparisons with its own.

I am well aware of the general belief that there is no homely bride and that there is no stupid Bar Mitzvah boy. The former is enhanced by the aura of love surrounding her. The latter is polished up and prepared so that he shines like the breastplate on a Torah.

Still, some Bar Mitzvahs are more shining than others and yesterday I attended a service where the young man, newly admitted to the Congregation of Israel, was so good at what he did that he could have been one of my own grandsons... and that is as perfect as anyone can get.

THE CELEBRANT, David Joel Lazar, is the grandson of Miriam Schoolman, one of my oldest (in point of service) and dearest friends. Further, I know the other grandmother, Bonnie Linderman, and knew the two grandfathers, both now deceased. I love the parents, Leslie and Richard. In addition, I know Bonnie's second husband, David Linderman. My family and Mim Schoolman's have been close since time began. Even the great grandparents of David Lazar were part of my life.

So I must admit that I was favorably disposed when I entered the sanctuary of B'nai Torah in Highland Park. Moreover, the Rabbi, Sholom Singer, is an old friend and a former neighbor, years ago in Hyde Park.

The service was held in late afternoon. Everything helped to make it lovely, including the day itself, and the sun streaming through the east windows of the synagogue on either side of the Ark. David, the rising son, was as brilliant as that setting sun that warmed the waters of Lake Michigan, which I could see from the pew I occupied.

RABBI SINGER, ONE OF MY favorite men in the pulpit, was at his best that afternoon, but it was David Lazar himself who was the star. He read the portion of the service assigned to him equally reverently and competently in English and in Hebrew.

One of the most remarkable aspects of this service and one that I found particularly significant was the fact that this was a "twin" Bar Mitzvah. David was admitted as a son of the covenant not only by himself, but through him, for his twin, a young Russian boy of the same age who lives in Kishinev. There, such a ceremony would not be possible. David, in his talk following the Torah reading, spoke of the "twin," Alexander, who will be sent a certificate noting that he was also part of this ceremony in Highland Park, by proxy.

My Rabbi tells me that a Bar Mitzvah is not dependent on a ceremony and occurs when a boy reaches manhood at 13. It is fitting, therefore, that David's far away "twin," Alexander, should be informed of his part in the American ceremony.

A SPECIAL CERTIFICATE WILL BE SENT to the boy in Russia. It is to be devoutly hoped that he will receive it.

You remember the telephone commercial that advises us to "reach out and touch somebody." David Lazar reached out to touch the Russian Bar Mitzvah yesterday and in doing so, he really touched this old heart of mine.

Obituaries

Joseph Leftwich Dies In London

LONDON — Joseph Leftwich, poet, translator, biographer and journalist, who was a dominant literary figure in British Jewry, died here at the age of 90. He is believed responsible in great part for opening the treasure trove of Yiddish literature to the English-speaking world.

He was a co-worker and associate of Jewish personalities including Israel Zangwill, Vladimir Jabotinsky, Sholem Asch, Stefan Zweig, Nahum Sokolow, and others.

In 1920 he became the editor of the London bureau of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

Milton Firestone, 55; K. City Editor Dies

KANSAS CITY — Milton Firestone, whose 20-year career as editor of the Kansas City Jewish Chronicle had placed him in the top echelon of Jewish community status, died of an apparent heart attack at the age of 55. He had served as treasurer and vice president of the American Jewish Press Association, and had received many local awards.

Jewish leaders expressed shock at the death of a man they considered a fixture of Jewish life here.

Sylvan Cole Dies In Palm Beach

PALM BEACH, FL. — Sylvan Cole, honorary president and founder of the Palm Beach Chapter of the American Jewish Committee, died at his Palm Beach home at the age of 93. A native of Pomona, Calif., he began his shirt business in Los Angeles in 1911 with several stores, called the Dollar Shirt Shops. Today there are 200 stores called the National Shirt Shops.

David Karin, 67; Waldbaum Official

NEW YORK — A heart attack took the life of David Karin, 67, of Waldbaum, Inc., supermarket chain. He was a leader in campaigns for the UJA and Israel Bonds, and was on the national commission of the ADL.

Mitchum Is Defended For Hitleristic Views

LOS ANGELES — A defender of Robert Mitchum, the actor who starred in "Winds of War" and then in an interview in Esquire Magazine unburdened himself of some of the most vicious anti-Semitism from a public figure in years, has arisen and he is an Israeli.

MENACHEM GOLAN, the successful Israel producer, told Michelle Samit of Israel Today here that Mitchum was trying to be funny when after being asked about the slaughter of six million Jews, responded "So the Jews say." Mitchum added that he would like to travel to Israel sporting a button, "I like Eich."

Golan said the interview, which was conducted by Barry Behfeld, was meant to be humorous. "He is always joking, all the time. Often his jokes are mistaken..."

WHEN BEHFELD said that Mitchum, according to the interview, without being asked offered the quip, "How do you say 'trust me' in Jewish?," his answer was, "F-k you."

Golan said he is preparing to make a film in Israel starring Mitchum.

A different view came from David Lehrer of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith. He said that the ADL is "troubled by the kinds of insensitivity shown toward the Jewish people by Robert Mitchum." It is his opinion that the article

did represent Mitchum's true feelings because the League can cite other articles quoting Mitchum in similar ways. He exclaimed, whether Mitchum was joking or drunk didn't matter, the fact is when people are fooling around, their true feelings come out. Lehrer claimed that openly publishing Mitchum's remarks could encourage others to make the same kinds of comments.

IN A NEWSPAPER article in January, a reporter, Gustav Unger, asked Mitchum how he manages to "stay fit and in good shape" and the actor replied, "Actually I lie around and live it up like a rich Jew."

Mitchum's agent Tom Chasen, was unavailable for comment. A spokesperson for his agency said she felt the coloring of the article just wasn't fair. It portrayed their client in a negative light because all the quotes the reporter chose to use were taken out of context. She added, "If Bob's whole interview was published, people would have understood that he was just having a little fun."

AT BOTH Paramount and ABC, the two companies involved with "Winds of War," the same types of excuses were given for the interview. Both publicity departments had prepared statements claiming that Mitchum's remarks were misunderstood by the Esquire reporter.

Ex-JDC Press Director Charges It Muffled Him

JERUSALEM — Eliezer Whartman, former public relations director of the Joint Distribution Committee in Israel, has taken his "freedom of the press case" to the world board of the JDC. Whartman had written an article for The Jerusalem Post supporting Israel's moral and legal right to settle the West Bank.

WHEN he received a rebuke from Zev Heimowitz, the JDC Israel director, ordering that any future "political" articles

be submitted to him in advance, Whartman resigned, claiming his right of freedom of speech had been infringed. Heimowitz responded that the JDC has been granted tax exempt status by the United States and therefore had to be strictly apolitical.

In his letter to the board, Whartman charged that "my right as an American and Israeli citizen have been grossly violated by JDC-Israel." He added: "Knowing something of the history of the organization, the great leaders that once headed it, and its determination to protect the civil rights of Jews everywhere, I thought that JDC would be the last organization in the world to muzzle free expression of opinion, a right guaranteed not only by the Constitution, but by Israel's Declaration of Independence, which assures each citizen of freedom of speech and conscience."

WHARTMAN said he was turning the matter over to the Israel Civil Liberties Union.

Reflect Similar Views On Intermarriage, Interdating

Many Surveys Of Jewish Teenagers Made In U.S.

The survey of Jewish teenagers showing their views on interdating and pre-marital sex, etc. (P-O, Feb. 16) was far from being the only survey conducted among American Jewish teenagers.

SHIRLEY ROVINSKY, WHO HOLDS a MSW degree, did such a survey in Dallas in 1981 for her thesis for the University of Texas at Arlington, and previous surveys had been made in Birmingham in 1971, New Orleans in 1966 and Wilkes-Barre, Pa., in 1965. Other surveys were conducted in Pittsburgh in 1967 and Savannah in 1966, but these were not available.

The Wilkes-Barre study was conducted by the American Jewish Committee and the Essex County Jewish Community Center of Wilkes-Barre, and

was made among 225 teenagers, 88 of whom were Orthodox, 101 Conservative and 27 Reform. It showed that the distance from Orthodoxy widens as the impact of traditional sources of Jewish identification diminishes. Most of the teenagers were High Holiday types, but three out of four said they would like to know more about Judaism and Jewish matters. Forty percent said that marrying within the Jewish faith was not considered essential to being a good Jew, while 61 percent had interdated.

THE NEW ORLEANS STUDY MADE a year later reached 107 teenagers, 87 of whom said that they had at one time or another dated a non-Jewish person. Only four percent chose the rabbi as a

person with whom they would discuss their problems, and 77 percent indicated that they were dissatisfied with their religious education.

In the Birmingham study in which 205 teens participated, the respondents felt good about being Jewish, but their experience in Jewish education was not satisfying. In their earlier years the rabbi had been their most positive influence, but by the 12th grade the rabbi had the strongest negative influence. The practice of interdating decreased with age, and less than a majority thought it was all right to marry a non-Jew. About one-third did not approve of pre-marital sex. The degree of adherence to Jewish values was directly related to the Orthodoxy of the institutions they were affiliated with.

Kosher Price Probe Made In Palm Beach

By HY WHITE

PALM BEACH, FL. (P-O) — Golden Lakes Temple in suburban West Palm Beach is investigating what board members claim is the excessively high price of kosher food.

TWO RETIRED lawyers, Sam Eisenfeld and Isidore Sapir, said they were appointed by the temple's board to investigate the differences in price between kosher and non-kosher foods and whether there is "gouging" through price increases before Passover.

"The price differences are too great for any reasonable explanation," Eisenfeld, former chief officer in the New York City Department of Investigations, said. "We are going to spend about two weeks on this."

THEY SHOWED examples of chicken livers at 99¢ in a supermarket and \$1.29 in a kosher market; corned beef at \$3.92 a pound in a regular market and \$5.98 in a kosher store.

Long ago there were no kosher shops in this area. People from here wishing kosher products mailed their order to Jacksonville or took a trip to Miami. No questions were asked about price.

But not so long ago there was one kosher butcher shop in the county...and even then some Jews still journeyed to Miami to make their meat purchases.

BUT IT'S a different story today. With the large influx of Jews to Century Village in the western part of West Palm Beach the Century Kosher Market opened close to the village. It had a monopoly.

With the spread of the Jewish population throughout the county the picture changed. Came the growth of additional synagogues and additional kosher markets. One opened in Delray Beach where 40 years ago it was considered an anti-Semitic town.

EACH SUNDAY their ads appear in the local paper and they offer their own competitive bargains.

But from the action of the Golden Lakes Temple it appears that they are not competitive enough.

Attorney General Gets Facts

N.Y. May Investigate High Kosher Prices

NEW YORK — The State Attorney General has under advisement action against price-fixing of kosher products both for Passover and year-round following a 10-hour hearing here of pricing practices in the kosher industry.

Assemblyman Sheldon Siver told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that evidence of a pattern of price fixing had emerged from the hearing and that the testimony was turned

over to the attorney general's office, which had a representative at the hearing.


Siver said in advance of the hearing that kosher chicken prices wholesale were 98 cents a pound as against 45 cents a pound for non-kosher. "We don't believe that the production costs can account for the great disparity in the price between kosher and non-kosher chickens."

The Trump Tower, 68 floors of elegant steel shooting up into New York's skyline on 57th Street and Fifth Avenue, and the Pichat Shalom region in the western section of the Negev accelerating development of the Donald J. Trump Project — thousands of miles and lifestyles apart — but joined together irrevocably by a 38-year-old business whiz name Donald J. At the reception, I greeted George Klein, Republican national Jewish liaison leader and real estate industrialist; Dr. Mordecai HaCohen, a top executive of Bank Leumi who was introducing the new president of the bank in the U.S., Israeli David Novick. The Hon. Jerome Becker, who recently resigned as a New York City Criminal Court Judge, quite active on the Jewish scene and on JNF's N.Y. board along with Roy Cohen, another prominent attorney who wore a gray tuxedo among the many black tuxes. Former Governor Hugh L. Carey, pounds lighter since leaving as head of New York State, with luscious wife Evangeline Gouletas Carey, who looked regal in a long black velvet gown outlined in gold braiding, which also in a lighter version was threaded through her hair braid. The Careys were the dinnermates of the Leonard Goldensons, ABC-TV president who has just retired. Both couples, guests of Donald Trump, he told all.

Gov. Cuomo's newest appointee, Dr. Israel Mowshowitz, liaison to the Jewish community, delivered greetings from Gov. Cuomo and also gave the invocation. Mowshowitz is now rabbi emeritus of the Hillcrest Jewish Center. Hank Sopher, JNF N.Y. Region head was dinner co-chairman, sharing the introductory honors with Ben Holloway, a close friend of the Trump family.

Donald Trump, appearing even years younger than 38, with a boyish grin, told the 1,500 guests that he accepted the JNF bid to honor him — noting that there had been numerous requests rejected from many notable organizations "because a dear friend, Bunny Lindenbaum, who passed on several years ago was such a strong supporter and taught us what the initials JNF has meant in the growth of Israel. ..." (Lindenbaum was a prominent attorney involved in real estate, a Brooklyn resident, lifetime member of the Brooklyn Jewish Center. A number of his family and law associates were present 'shaping nachus' ...)

Dr. I. Cohen, JNF executive, represented the group, as President Charlotte Jacobson was in Israel where the JNF was holding its annual meeting. Dr. Cohen explained about the Donald Trump project in Pichat Shalom named in honor of this young man who heads one of the top, if not the top real estate developing firms in the USA. For his dedication and commitment, JNF is naming its project in Pichat Shalom for him. Located less than ten kilometers from the newly-created border with Egypt, it was created to provide those settlers relocating from the Sinai with homes, industry and security.

Don Trump had his wife, sister, brother, parents (Fred Trump who built thousands of Brooklyn homes over 40 years ago where Jews were the principal buyers) stand up for recognition.

"We're putting up Lincoln West — a building four blocks in length, right in back of Lincoln Center's Metropolitan Opera House," he told me. Hirschfeld's son, Ely, is married to Marsha Riklis, Meshulam's daughter, and granddaughter of the lovely couple at the table. Marsha told me that she is expecting a second child in August. They have a three-year-old daughter, Dannille. Hirschfeld told me. He has three other grandchildren, ages 7, 12 and 14, children of his daughter, Rachel. Rachel has just opened a large restaurant in Manhattan, he said. Wife Zipporah Hirschfeld is down in Palm Beach where Abe goes weekends, he said. "We'll be celebrating Passover in Palm

Jews By Choice

Many Replies To Her Conversion Poll

Several weeks ago I threw out a question to readers who have converted to Judaism:

Would you, no matter what your affiliation, be willing to follow the Orthodox process for conversion? The idea sprang from some P-O editorials that offered this as a first step towards making converts to Judaism "real Jews" in the eyes of all established movements.



THE RESULTS OF MY "poll" was quite a surprise. Rather than the expected quickie responses — yes or no — I received primarily long, articulate, beautifully-reasoned letters reflecting a variety of positions, each of which could easily be the subject of a column. No pattern emerged, however, unless you consider as a pattern the wonderfully diverse perspectives that, with tolerance, epitomize the dynamism and life that is Judaism.

I heard from people who had undergone Reform conversions and were resentful that anyone doubted their validity. One woman, in fact, described the process of her conversion and saw no qualitative difference between it and the Orthodox process — and in her case, I think she was right. Another woman described what is going on in the innovative Denver community, where conversions are conducted under the auspices of all the branches of Judaism working in concert. While this makes

her Reform conversion kosher in the eyes of Orthodox Jews in Denver, she doubts it would be meaningful in Israel — and I think she's also right. One man went through a Reform conversion and then decided to go whole (you should excuse the expression) hog and do it again with an Orthodox rabbi. He, for one, is thrilled that he did — circumcision and all.

I ALSO HEARD FROM BORN JEWS (we've got to come up with better terminology!), who were convinced the breach is unbreachable between Orthodoxy and modern Judaism. What a pity! Reform Jews reflect an anger at being unrecognized as a valid form of Judaism and are vociferous in their objections to being forced to conform to standards they find philosophically untenable — and having the same be done to those choosing Judaism. I didn't hear from any Orthodox born Jews.

While I found something inspiring in each response, overall the experience depressed me. Here we are, a people beleaguered in the world, and we have to play religious one-upmanship with each other. Seems suicidal somehow. And take it from one who knows, it can be painful to be rejected out of hand by a segment of one's own, by adoption or otherwise. Ironic that family would be "unacceptable" in Israel, but shoud the neo-Nazi run amok in Merced, the Hofmanns could be first on their list.

Eve Was Adam's Equal, Not Helpmate

Jewish feminists will applaud the effort of R. David Freedman of the University of California at Davis to interpret Genesis 2:18 differently than the Revised Standard Version which reads "It is not good that a man should be alone; I will make him a helper fit for him." The scholar translates two words of the quotation "ezer" and "kenegdo" as "strength" and "equal" respectively, making the interpretation mean that the passage really describes Eve as Adam's "power equal." An Old Testament specialist, James A. Sanders, in the current issue of "Biblical Archeology Review" agrees that the Freedman translation "is worth considering" and makes a good case.

USFL Franchise Holder

While Jews hold a number of the franchises in the professional basketball, they now hold at least one in the new football league, the Philadelphia Stars, in Myles Tanenbaum, whose title is managing general partner. He is president of Charter Oak Investment Co. He is actively Jewish, starting with the presidency of Temple Sinai's Young People's League, and later serving in almost every capacity in Congregation Melrose B'nai Israel.

The Hebrew Teacher

When he enrolled at the San Francisco Theological Seminary at San Anselmo, the first course that Cavin Chinn, born of Chinese parents in San Francisco, took was Hebrew "of all things," as he put it. It sparked a fascination and now that he is director of Field Education at the Seminary, he teaches a class in biblical Hebrew. Following graduation, while working with several Indian tribes in Central Oregon, he became friends with a clinical psychologist whose son was to become bar mitzvah, and when she learned the Chinn knew Hebrew asked him to teach her son the Hebrew, which he did for two years in preparation for his bar mitzvah.

The Sports Czar

Abigail (Abby) Hoffman, director of Sports Canada, which hopes to improve Canada's 14th place in the 1980 Olympics, is half-Jewish but considers herself Jewish in the non-religious cultural sense. She competed for Canada in four Olympics and held the Commonwealth record for the 800 metres, plus was Canadian champion at that distance for 13 years. She directs a budget of \$35 million, but believes that a budget five times that and more could make Canada into a second East Germany whose athletes seem to dominate. "It's important for Canadians to excel in sport," she told Sheldon Kirshner of the Canadian Jewish News. She said that if enough financial support were available Canadian athletes with promise could postpone their university studies or professional careers and receive the best possible coaching and training.

The Dallas Actress

That Susan Howard, who plays the part of Donna in "Dallas" has not gotten over her infatuation with Israel was seen as a letter from her appeared in The Jerusalem Post on the first anniversary of the visit of members of the "Dallas" cast to Israel. AT LAST—A SOVIET DEFEAT

According to a large group of U.S. generals and admirals, Russia—through its Soviet-equipped Syrian surrogate—has suffered a major defeat which puts into serious question the viability of Soviet weaponry and military doctrine.

In an open letter to President Reagan, more than 130 retired generals and admirals have written that Israel "... has made major breakthroughs in conventional and electronic weaponry designed to overwhelm and destroy Soviet-made weapons systems." The general and flag officers go on to say: "We believe that the victory of Israeli-modified American weapons and tactics over those of the Soviet Union presents the free world with a tremendous opportunity to reduce the impact of Russia's extraordinary growth in tactical forces and battlefield technology."

This letter (see text below) marks only the second time in the history of our republic that a large and distinguished group of senior military officers has publicly offered advice to their Commander in Chief.

The world's attention has been focused on the crushing of the PLO in Lebanon; the extraordinary significance of the defeat of Soviet arms has been allowed to pass with little comment by the Administration. This is why the officers ask Mr. Reagan to recognize the value of these battle-tested

innovations and to revitalize our strategic cooperation with Israel.

This message, sponsored by the Center for International Security, is part of a nationwide effort to inform the public on significant defense issues. We finance this work entirely through voluntary contributions. If you would like to help, please refer to the box below.

Here is the full text of the officers' letter to the President, followed by a list of signators in alphabetical order:

Dear Mr. President:

As former members of our country's military and naval services, we are taking the liberty of addressing you directly on a national defense matter of great concern to us as private citizens.

Only once before in our nation's history have large numbers of senior retired officers publicly offered advice to their Commander in Chief. On January 21, 1979, alarmed by the then Administration's apparent complacency about rising Soviet military strength and geopolitical gains, many of us wrote your predecessor to express our views. It was gratifying to find that our concerns were reflected on November 4th, 1980, in the mandate which the people gave you to rearm America and to challenge Soviet aggression. The first two years of your Administration have proven the sincerity of your personal beliefs and expressed intention of restoring the security of the United States and the free world.

We are troubled, however, that the profound military significance of the decisive defeat of Soviet arms in Lebanon is being obscured by the political turmoil surrounding Israel's armed intervention. We believe that the victory of Israeli-modified American weapons and tactics over those of the Soviet Union presents the free world with a tremendous opportunity to reduce the impact of Russia's extraordinary growth in tactical forces and battlefield technology.

Despite denials in some quarters, it is clear to us that the Israelis have made major breakthroughs

in conventional and electronic weaponry designed to overwhelm and destroy Soviet-made weapons systems. Advanced, battle-proven technology and tactics, as deployed by our Middle East ally, offer a unique opportunity to diminish the present quantitative superiority of Soviet forces in Europe. These advances are in the areas of anti-armor, missile site suppression, and aerial combat, as well as command, control and communications (C³):

- a modified 105mm shell which pierced the honeycomb armor of the formidable Soviet T-72 main battle tank;
- highly advanced Electronic Counter Measures (ECM) and strike techniques which neutralized and destroyed Syrian SA-6, SA-8 and SA-9 Soviet-made missile arrays without loss;
- enhanced air-to-air missile and other aerial ECM and tactics which resulted in an unprecedented combat kill ratio of at least 85-0 against Soviet aircraft; and
- a unique C³ ability to coordinate air, land and sea operations down to the unit level.

This combination of combat-proven high technology and tactics employed under remarkable Israeli generalship, together with new NATO arms technology and targeting systems already under development, could conceivably revolutionize the overall U.S. defense posture and offers exciting prospects for arms control and disarmament negotiations. Furthermore, the adoption of these modern, advanced technologies could make a favorable

impact upon future defense posts and the national budgets of the United States and our allies.

An enhanced defense for NATO forces, achieved through the incorporation of the lessons of the war in Lebanon, raises the intriguing possibility of reducing the reliance on escalation to tactical nuclear weapons because of conventional battlefield inferiority.

The entire Soviet "Wave theory" of advance in the Central Front of NATO movement of mass formations of armor and infantry, closely supported by Warsaw Pact air, all protected by integrated mobile missile air defense systems. If Pact tanks can be knocked out with unique penetrating shells, if SAM sites can be neutralized and destroyed in large numbers, and if their aircraft can be shot down in a virtual Turkey Shoot, then established Soviet military doctrine comes into question.

But lest the free world relax and congratulate itself on the recent victory of Israeli-manned American arms over those of the Russians, the crushing defeat of the Soviet-equipped PLO and Syrians in Lebanon should be recognized as a possible harbinger of future Russian aggression.

According to the best unclassified intelligence, the initial Soviet reaction to their losses was to blame Syrian manpower for ineptitude. Neither Soviet military doctrine nor equipment inadequacies were considered as factors. There is now reason to believe that the Soviets are no longer so certain.

However, the current strained relations between Washington and Jerusalem do not augur well for utilizing what you yourself have called "Recognizing the Israeli Asset" in your *Washington Post* article of August 15, 1979: "... the paramount American interest in the Middle East is to prevent the region from falling under the domination of the Soviet Union. ... Israel has the democratic will, national cohesion, technological capacity and military fiber to stand forth as America's trusted ally ... Therefore, it is foolhardy to risk weakening our most critical remaining strategic asset."

For example, Israeli ports and bases would be

open instantly to U.S. forces in the event of a serious strategic threat to the Middle East. Israel constitutes the only U.S. ally capable of immediate parity to a serious thrust against free world interests in this theater. And, Israel's continued sharing of vital intelligence on Soviet operations constitutes the other essential element of U.S. security in the Middle East.

Your 1979 views have proven prescient indeed, Mr. President. We concur in your assessment of our ally's "... geopolitical importance as a stabilizing force, as a deterrent to radical hegemony and as a military offset to the Soviet Union." Therefore, your present initiative on the Middle East must carefully consider the Israeli requirement of strategic depth for her own security, lest our ally be transformed from a strategic asset into a liability.

We have every confidence, Mr. President, that transitory political strains will not be allowed to detract from the fundamental congruence of strategic interests cemented by a common heritage of Western values and democratic ideals.

Mr. President, we therefore urge you to revitalize the strategic cooperation between the United States and Israel, thereby enhancing the safety and well-being of the free peoples of the world.

Report On Massacres At 2 Camps Rapped

"Who is wise, one who has foresight," state the Sages in The Tractate Avot.



The Kahan Commission of Inquiry into the events in the Sabra and Chatilla Camps in its recently released report, from the comfortable position of pure hindsight, for indirect responsibility faulted Defense Minister Ariel Sharon, the Chief of Staff, and three generals of the IDF, slapped the Foreign Minister's wrist, frowned upon the head of the Mossad, and took a brief but stern look at the Prime Minister — all for a presumed lack of foresight into the possible immoral actions of the Phalangists in the "refugee camps" of Sabra and Chatilla.

THEY DID NOT find blameless the Lebanese Government for its ineptness, the Lebanese Army for its adamant refusal to enter the camps and the U.S. Government for failing to use its influence on both the Lebanese Government and its army. The Commission found no fault whatsoever with the decision to send the Phalangists into the camps to carry their part of the load in fighting the PLO terrorists. It even

considered it "laudable" that the IDF officers wished to save the lives of their soldiers and therefore, in response to public demands, sent in the Phalangists.

The Commission's basic criticism is for a lack of closer supervision over the operation, by the IDF, and a failure to halt the action quickly enough when the officers learned of Phalangist "excesses".

THERE IS, HOWEVER, a major flaw in the Commission's arguments.

In its detailed 140-page report, which we studied very carefully, it records repeated warnings by both General Amos Yaron and General Amin Drori to the "Phalangist liaison officers and to Elie Hobeika not to kill women and children," and upon receiving even sketchy unconfirmed reports of such possible killings, a further warning, and finally a complete cessation of the Phalangist operation — all within a 24-hour period, from Thursday night Sept. 16 at 6 p.m. to Friday night at about the same time.

Saturday, Sept. 18 by 8 a.m. the Phalangists were out of the camps, after using their own bulldozers (not those of the IDF) to clear rubble. Prior to this action, "heavy fire coming out of Chatilla was directed at

one IDF battalion . . . one of the soldiers was killed, 20 were injured and the advance of the battalion in this direction was halted." Obviously the camps were fortresses for the 2,000 well-armed PLO terrorists entrenched therein.

THE PHALANGISTS met with fierce resistance and suffered casualties. That their battle ethics was not the same as that of the IDF was clear and for good reason, but on the basis of their past performance in coordination with the IDF, the Phalangists were a relatively well disciplined force.

IDF officers had every right to anticipate a proper efficient and orderly operation in the camps with a minimum of "civilian" casualties. The Commission's only comment on this matter was non-committal: "experience and intuition are very valuable, but it is preferable that they not constitute the sole basis on which decisions are taken." The Commission appears not to have a sufficient appreciation of the house-to-house type of fighting necessitated in these "camps" with everyone there either a PLO terrorist or a collaborator and potential combatant.

THE COMMISSION dealt at length about Phalangist battle tactics but it ignored

completely the totally immoral tactics of the PLO terrorists within the camps wherein "civilians", if any, including women and children may be armed and working closely with the terrorists. A Phalangist officer, interviewed by Israel TV, stated simply, "You know the PLO tactics. They train 10-year-old boys to shoot with guns." The Commission never really confirmed what was loosely termed a "massacre" or "pogrom". The Commission estimated the population of the camps at about 56,000. Casualties counted by the International Red Cross were 328, "Palestinians along with Iranians, Syrians and members of other nationalities . . . the great majority of the dead were males; as for women and children, there were eight Lebanese women and 12 Lebanese children, and seven Palestinian women and eight Palestinian children."

The Commission repeats over and over again a single report from an unconfirmed source, a Phalangist, relating by radio contact the killing of "300 terrorists and civilians. This was evidently a slip of the tongue on his part, for he immediately tried to play down the assessment by decreasing the number of casualties to 120." No really authentic figure was given of casualties and no one knows precisely how many were terrorists and how many truly "civilians". Further, an IDF forward command post was established on a roof overlooking the entry of the Phalangists to observe the fighting. "The Divisional Intelligence Officer tried to follow their movements using binoculars which he shifted from place to place, but was unable to see their movements or their actions." In other

words, by the Commission's own report, the IDF officers had warned the Phalangists repeatedly to avoid killing "civilians", then made every effort to observe their actions, and then later to remove the Phalangists promptly.

UNDER these circumstances it would appear to us that while one of course regrets the demise of a single innocent person, the Commission has blown this minor battle of the Phalangists versus the PLO terrorists far out of proportion to the entire Peace for Galilee operation and its insistence on greater supervision of it by the Prime Minister, Defense Minister, Chief of Staff and a host of officers, illogical and unwarranted. As to the charge of faulty communication between the various agencies, the Commission ignores totally that Friday, normally a short working day for staff, was also the eve of Rosh Hashanah, and obviously a day difficult to reach all parties quickly.

The entire report, concentrating as it does on just 38 hours of an operation, minor in character, reminds us of a surgeon placing a specimen under a powerful microscope for a minute examination. Naturally every little detail would be greatly exaggerated. So is this report, albeit it is well prepared and thoroughly documented. As the findings are exaggerated, so are the recommendations. If there were "indirect" crimes, the punishment proposed far outstripped the "crimes." It appears to us by the evidence in this report and the circumstances prevailing, that reasonable care was exercised by all concerned.

The impasse continued for a dozen years during which the couple had a son, Sebastian, now eight. A prosperous architect, Sergin was boycotted and virtually impoverished. Sebastian was humiliated in school and his Rumanian grandparents made moves to induct him.

The Vlads at time contemplated suicide. They then went on a protest hunger strike — and after 36 days finally got permission to make aliyah. In Israel they were cordially received — and are destined to live happily ever after.

The so-called crisis in relations between Washington and Jerusalem is entirely a product of the machinations of anti-Israel elements in the State Department. They have seized upon every possible opportunity to smear Israel, and where "evidence" was not handy, they have not been adverse to manufacturing it.

The drive has begun to boomerang. If anyone in Washington thought that creation of a crisis would turn Israelis against their own government, they erred badly. The obviously crude anti-Israel campaign let loose in the media from within the Reagan administration has only strengthened the resolve of Israelis to endorse the policies of their government.

How does the State Department now back down?

Very simple. The replacement of Arik Sharon by Moshe Arens in the post of Defense Minister gives them the excuse they need. What Reagan, Shultz and Weinberger have in mind for Israel is completely unacceptable to Jerusalem. It's not going to be so easy for the Americans to eat crow and retreat from a program which not, it is clear, even the PLO rejects, but at least they seem to be trying to clear the air.

Max Fisher Should Win

We hope Max Fisher stands his ground in the matter of Raphael Kotlowitz, who heads the Jewish Agency's Aliyah and Absorption Department and whom the board of governors of the Jewish Agency seeks to replace.

As far as what has been published, the charge is that Mr. Kotlowitz has filled his department with political appointees, in this case, Likud supporters, and presumably the deduction is that these appointees are less than qualified because they were selected first on their political affiliations.

Not too long ago, the board of governors of The Jewish Agency, which is made up of 50 percent of diaspora Jewish leaders, won an agreement that it would have the right of approval for all appointees to top positions in the Agency. Now that prerogative is in question, and Mr. Begin is supporting his close friend, Mr. Kotlowitz.

If the Jewish Agency were to lose the talents of Mr. Fisher and the others that work along with him like Chuck Hoffberger, Raymond Epstein, Melvin Dubinsky, etc., the organization would in fact be actually castrated. Knowing Mr. Fisher, we believe he will not yield when the alternatives are productivity as against politics.

Aliyah to Israel from the west has dragged along unsuccessfully long before the establishment of the state. Many hands have held the reins. None has been successful. Not Mr. Kotlowitz and not Gen. Uzi Narkiss before him. And possibly not a successor either.

That however does not alter the situation. Good leadership and good morale are essential to the prosecution of any endeavor.

The issue here is politics or good management, and in that case there should be only one choice.

Could Prof. Chomsky Be Right?

By a quirk of reporting the view expressed by Noam Chomsky before the Brandeis University Political Forum that he has no love for the State of Israel or for any other states because all states are violent appeared in our issue last week with the retraction by the Oxford University Union of a resolution it passed 50 years ago stating, "This House Would Not Fight For King Or Country." The vote this time was 416 to 187 against the motion which when carried in 1933 was believed to have given encouragement to the Nazis who felt that the British would not fight.

Two Jews, both now famous in their own right, Prof. Chomsky, who is a leading world linguistics authority, and Lord Beloff now face this same question, and one apologizes for the stand he took in 1933, which is the same stand in many respects that Prof. Chomsky is taking in 1983.

The report in The Post and Opinion came from The Justice, the student newspaper at Brandeis, and while that report was in some detail, no newspaper account can present the nuances that come through in a speech, and it could be that either Prof. Chomsky was misquoted or not quoted fully enough. We would suspect the latter.

History has proven Lord Beloff, who at that time was an Oxford student, wrong, and his story may or may not prove Prof. Chomsky wrong.

There is no gainsaying though of Prof. Chomsky's fundamental position. That was quite evident. He is a pacifist to a degree which American Jewry, who give number one priority to peace in all their rituals, could hardly endorse. We wonder what Prof. Chomsky would have to say about 1948 when the Jewish State was declared and five Arab nations immediately invaded an almost defenseless country which had no arms and no army and to which not only the Arabs but the world at large gave almost no chance for survival.

The EDITOR'S CHAIR

WHILE IN FLORIDA to attend the national commission meeting of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, we spent a few days at the Boca Teeca Country Club Estates at Boca Baton. This was a repeat of an experience of 10 years ago when we stayed there then, and have never gotten over the experience.

If you like Florida, and if you like leisurely golf, and if you have pleasant companions, you would like Boca Teeca.

We met Leon Cohen, who is a member of Rabbi Irving Lehrman's Temple Emanuel in Miami Beach where he lives, and who spends two days a week as administrator of Boca Teeca. While he resisted our questions about his Jewish activities, referring us to Simon Kovens, who evidently is the big principal of Boca Teeca, and who is president of Mt. Sinai Hospital in Miami Beach, and on the board of the Miami Jewish Federation, etc.

But Leon and we got along fine, and if we could boast about a good golf score, we'd be telling that to you. But what we can praise was not only the course, but the accommodations at the guest house and the food at the restaurant.

Boca Teeca is a golf course community (27 holes) located on 320 acres, sporting 22 buildings with a total of 1,184 units, none of which are unsold. A new condominium is now being developed with four buildings and 30 town houses. The first of the four buildings is an 89-unit which is now being offered for sale.

We'll have other aspects of our Florida trip to tell you about later, but we should not leave the subject without telling you about Redd and Dorothy Slung of Louisville, who live in a similar development at Palm Aire in Pompano Beach. It is our pleasure to engage Redd in golf, and the Slungs can be the most hospitable people in the world. Redd was one of the best basketball players Louisville ever developed in the days when the YMHA team was the equal of any college five.

Both Redd and his brother Louis, whose pen name is Louis Shaeffer (he won the Pulitzer prize for his biography of Eugene O'Neil) followed me to the University of North Carolina. We were able to get together with Lou when we made our frequent trips to New York, but now that we haven't been to the Big Apple in several years, we were hoping our trip to Florida this year would coincide, but unfortunately that didn't eventuate.

THE AMERICAN ASSOCIATION for Ethiopian Jews has established a scholarship at Ben Gurion University in the name of William P. Halpern. He was the young man who devised the program which has seen 2,500 Falasha find a haven in Israel when all the Israelis and all the American Jewish community to all practical purposes had washed their hands, saying that Ethiopia would not permit any of the Falasha to leave.

We knew Bill, that is after he became involved in saving the Falasha. He was from Minneapolis, and he was an inspiration. He hid himself off to a country neighboring on Ethiopia where he found thousands of Ethiopians who had crossed the border as refugees.

Arens' Influence Already Felt?

JERUSALEM — Whether or not it is already the influence of Moshe Arens, the new Defense Minister, isn't certain, but a change has been noticed as far as relations with the Arabs in Israel.

Settlers in the West Bank have been warned that attacks on their Arab neighbors will not be tolerated, and 45 Jewish militants were arrested on the Temple Mount near the

Among them were Falasha, and these he forced Israel and the Jewish world, much against their wishes, to save. He was killed, as we recall, in an automobile accident in Sudan, and we believe he was about 26 years old.

Israeli Jewish youth is not without its heroes, diaspora Jewish youth too, and Bill Halpern is certainly one of them. Why would a University of Minnesota graduate student become so involved in saving Jews as to go to an almost primitive land against the judgement of Israel and the leaders of the world Jewish community? Why? The creative lives the Falasha are living in Israel today is the result of his courage and dedication.

IN CONNECTION WITH THE PIECE here last week about the two rabbis who were concerned about the direction of Reform Judaism, there was another point they insisted was harmful, and that was in the large percentage of women who were becoming rabbis. There was no discussion on what should have been the real issue — why women rabbis could not make as much if not more a contribution to Judaism, Reform and otherwise, but only on the fact that because of the plethora of women, men were eschewing the rabbinate.

We argued that there was no logic to that presumption. If someone is imbued with the idea of service to Judaism, why would the fact that there are women make a difference to another person's decision to enter the rabbinate? That is logic. The pragmatism is that fewer male candidates for the rabbinate are presenting themselves.

In any event, we felt that we should give you the full discussion that evening so that the views expressed by the two rabbis would be reported to you in full.

WHETHER OR NOT the Joint Distribution Committee could be charged with interfering in Israeli and American politics because its public relations director wrote an article supporting Israel's right to establish settlements in the West Bank is probably the essence of the situation which has led to the resignation of Eliezer Whartman from the JDC. In view of the fact that Whartman's article did not identify his relationship with the JDC, it would seem that his right of free expression did not violate regulations of the JDC, which is tax exempt and therefore felt that its status as such might be endangered.

There are writers for The Post and Opinion who hold even higher positions in Israeli institutions than did Mr. Whartman, and they have expressed views on almost every issue, political and military, with no thought whatsoever from the institutions they represent that their views be censored. In one case, the institution the columnist represents does have tax-exempt status.

We hope Mr. Whartman persists. He resigned when he was told future articles he wrote must be submitted for approval, so it is not his job that he is fighting for. He probably will be vindicated, and a landmark decision thus will have been achieved.

What Happened To Player On College Football Team

Webster defined anti-Semitism as hostility towards Jews, while he described ignorance as a display of lack of knowledge. Although these appear to be very different, many people find it difficult to discern between the two.

As one of the only Jews on my college football team I was frequently considered an enigma. "Is he one of us or one of them?" seemed to frequently cross the minds of my non-Jewish teammates. Their confusion became particularly acute during the High Holy Days.

I began my college career with an internal debate. The first game was scheduled on the same day as Rosh Hashonah. After a great deal of soul searching and a lengthy conversation with the school rabbi, I chose to attend services and forego the game. While this was a tumultuous choice for me, the decision of a freshman reserve to skip a game was unexplainable but not exactly earth shattering to the rest of the team.

The following spring the other Jewish player on the team, the kicker, discovered that the opening day of the next season was on Yom Kippur. Searching for alternatives the kicker approached the team with the possibility of changing the day of the game. The soul searching of the previous year be-

came suddenly important when I had to explain to an irate group of football players why a Jew won't play sports on this holiday.

Unconvinced, the team refused to reschedule the game and the kicker and myself were no longer just players. We had become Jewish players. However, total acceptance did seem at hand by the next season, with possible conflict avoided with the High Holidays falling on weekdays. Unfortunately, acceptance had its price.

Enjoying the camaraderie of the team, I looked forward to returning to practice the day after Yom Kippur. I expected the usual needling for my day off but what occurred was a shock. The price of acceptance was a joke I found on my locker. A swastika.

The word alone turns most Jews stomachs. The sight of one is worse. My emotions ran the gamut, beginning with rage and finally settling on frustration. This wasn't an act of hostility. It was an exhibition of stupidity.

I don't advocate the acceptance of this action or the universal usage of my explanation. Clearly, the line between ignorance and anti-Semitism is thin. But, Webster was aware of it and so, too, should we be.

Matzoh Prices Ripoff Again

As Passover approaches, the annual price scandal seems to be in full swing. Last year your paper published the highest prices for Passover foods.

Visiting the Safeway supermarket in Richmond, on Feb. 22, where most of the Jewish shopping is done, the Passover display was set up with its ripoff prices. Manishevitz matzohs are \$7.05 for the five pound package! Israeli matzoh, usually cheaper, is \$7.59 for the Yehuda Israeli package! Egg Matzoh is \$1.51 per box!! Strits and Goodmans are five cents cheaper per pound.

When the manager was asked about the increase, the same lines were repeated from a year earlier. He stated that the Jewish jobber from Baltimore, Joffee Bros., put out the display and set the prices. The outrageous costs not only make

it very difficult for poorer Jews to keep the Passover, but younger couples, who are encouraged to buy matzoh to observe the holiday, are turned off.

I've written to the Jewish papers in New York, but they will not discuss the pricing problem. The tie-in with advertisers and rabbis who are hired by the price-gourgers is obvious. The results here are that much of the Passover goods are not sold because many families arrange shopping expeditions to larger Jewish centers where the prices are much lower.

You are to be commended for your efforts. Keep up the good work.

The recipient will be the president of a local bank, and the cause is the Jewish National Fund. They are being solicited to buy trees, forests, etc.

Some of our Christian friends can't distinguish between Israel Bonds, Jewish National Fund, and B'nai B'rith. They are also questioning why the Jews are constantly coming to them and the non-Jewish "well" to raise money for Israel.

50:13. These 4 errors in a single passage seem to signify that if the New Testament cannot record a single passage of Jewish history correctly, can it be of divine inspiration?

One must also consider what the Messiah is to do and whether or not Jesus did this: "And they shall beat their swords into plowshares and spears into pruning hooks nor shall they learn war anymore." (Isaiah 2:4, 2:1-3 and 11-1-10). Since the Messianic prophecies were not fulfilled when Jesus came, a second coming had to be invented in order that Jesus can fulfill the prophecies which he did

not fulfill. The Jewish Bible, however, does not mention a second coming. Universal peace must accompany the Messiah and since peace has not come, the Messiah obviously has not.

One must conclude that the evidence is overwhelming that the Messiah has not yet arrived and against this evidence we are subjected to a dubious collection of isolated verses, forcibly wrenched out of context and invariably misinterpreted.

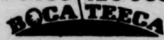

'Sophie's Choice' Review Criticized

His judgement of the movie's influence on the audience is devoid of any reality. To state that the biggest reaction of the audience came from the filthy language and the lurid sex scenes is obscene. There were some four letter words and there were some sex scenes, but they only accentuated the tragedy of Sophie's experience.

The audience was profoundly shaken by the atrocities committed by the butchers of the Third Reich and by the heart-breaking choice Sophie had to make. Adults were not ashamed to weep and left the movie in agony and anguish.

Meryl Streep did not act out a Sophie, she was Sophie. The role was easy for her because she identified 100 percent with Sophie and so forced the audience to suffer with her.

People who have any knowledge of the Holocaust and its effect on survivors will not call the film pretentious as Mr. Epstein assumes.

eliminate the problem of the PLO and the Palestinians, but destroyed the PLO as a concentrated force.

WHEN ASKED about the possibility of Moshe Arens becoming the next prime minister of Israel, Livne said the following: "Moshe Arens should make a very good replacement for Sharon. He understands the security problems and he had another big advantage, he knows the problem of P.R. here in the United States, having been here as an ambassador."

Ben-Kish added: "He can be as extreme as Sharon, maybe, but he can speak more politely and explain to the Americans what he thinks."

LIVNE JOINED IN: "In the long run I do not think he is going to replace Begin. If I look at the Likud party, the Foreign Minister (Shamir), for now at least, seems to be in a better position than Arens." He emphasized, "You must understand that to be prime minister in our system — in a democracy — Means elections and I do not know how the Likud party will view things if Begin goes. For the present — I think that only Begin's strong leadership holds the coalition together."

Both officers agreed that American Jews should express their opinion about Israeli politics freely but not publicly, especially if they are criticizing Israel. They said, that criticism of Israel should take place between Jewish leaders here and the Israeli leadership privately.

COL. LIVNE said, "We are having enough trouble with P.R. without American Jews criticizing Israeli politics openly. I think that your (American) opinion is very important to our leaders. We have a slogan in Israel: 'A good friend can be tested in tough times.' When Israel has tough times, Israel needs Jewish support, not criticism!"

Col. Livne continued: "The American Jewish people can assist Israel not only economically and politically, but those of you who can, should make aliyah to Israel. This is the most important support we need. We would need 300 thousand young American Jews in Israel. It would change our stature around the world!"

Father Of The Genocide Convention

Thirty-four years ago, in the press gallery of the Palais de Chaillot in Paris, a scholarly Jewish refugee from Poland watched as the General Assembly of the fledgling United Nations voted 55-0 to adopt the Genocide Convention.

The date was Dec. 9, 1948, and the press gallery witness

was Dr. Raphael Lemkin, who coined the work "genocide" and was the author and prime mover of the Convention — the first human rights treaty ever adopted by the UN.

Lemkin died penniless 11 years later. Today he is little-known despite having been nominated several times for the

Nobel Peace Prize.

To restore Raphael Lemkin's rightful place in history, "Reform Judaism" magazine published an appreciation of Lemkin's life and work, emphasizing his long and single-minded campaign on behalf of the Genocide Convention. The quarterly magazine, published by the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, also tracked down Lemkin's long-missing papers — biographical notes and a manuscript he had written but never published recounting the history of the crime he named: genocide.

LEMKIN was born in Eastern Poland in 1901. He studied philology, mastering nine languages, before turning to the study of law. After earning a doctorate he served as a public prosecutor in Warsaw and contributed to the codification of Poland's new penal codes.

During this period he began a study of the Armenian massacres that culminated in a proposal he made before the League of Nations in 1933 that the crime of "barbarity" — the "destruction of national, religious, and racial groups" — be declared an international offense. His proposal met with indifference.

On returning home, Lemkin was forced to resign his post by the pro-Nazi Polish government. He practiced and taught law and continued his efforts to gain support for his proposal before the League of Nations without success.

When the Nazis invaded Poland, Lemkin escaped to Sweden, where he began to compile documents that were to

form the basis of his 1944 analysis of Nazi jurisprudence, *Axis Rule in Occupied Europe*, published by the Carnegie Foundation. He was invited by Duke University to join its law faculty, and in 1941 arrived in the United States. Soon afterward he was hired as a consultant by the War Department.

IN 1946, while serving as an adviser to Supreme Court Justice Robert Jackson, the chief prosecutor at the Nuremberg War Crimes Tribunal, Lemkin learned that 49 members of his family had been murdered by the Nazis. He also learned that the agenda for the first regular session of the UN was being completed in New York.

Lemkin hastily returned to the United States, drafting a resolution against the crime of genocide en route. He then researched and drafted supporting statements for 30 nations, relating genocide to the history of each country.

On Dec. 11, 1946, the General Assembly unanimously resolved that genocide was an international crime and that a treaty should be drawn up defining it and establishing the judicial apparatus to counter it.

WHEN UN Secretary Trygve Lie asked him to submit a draft treaty, Lemkin resigned from the War Department to devote all his energies to passage of the treaty. For the following two years he thwarted numerous efforts to table his work. In Jan., 1951, after the 20th nation agreed to abide by the provisions of the Genocide Treaty, it became international law. "This is a day of triumph for mankind and the most

beautiful day in my life," Lemkin told reporters.

In researching the article, Steven Schnur, Reform Judaism's managing editor, located three persons who had been close to Lemkin — Maxwell T. Cohen, his attorney; Robert Lemkin, a distant cousin; and Dr. William Korey, director of international policy research for B'nai B'rith. Through them Schnur learned that Lemkin's voluminous papers were in the custody of Alexander Gabriel, a UN correspondent who had been one of Lemkin's most important contacts.

THE magazine also learned that Dr. Korey had recently initiated discussions with Dr. Vartan Gregorian, president of the New York Public Library, about the possibility of turning over the papers to the library. This was done last month; the papers are now in the care of Susan Davis, the library's curator of manuscripts and archives.

It is expected that within the next few years the library will mount a public exhibit on Lemkin, including selected papers. In at least one sense the exhibit will be ironic. The United States, which led the fight against the most genocidal tyrant in history, and which lent full support to the Genocide Treaty in its formative years, has still not ratified it.

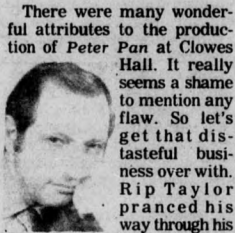

'Peter Pan' Not Taylor Made



There were many wonderful attributes to the production of *Peter Pan* at Clowes Hall. It really seems a shame to mention any flaw. So let's get that distasteful business over with. Rip Taylor pranced his way through his foppish portrayal of the villainous Captain Hook like a fey bunny rabbit. He couldn't even frighten a bunny rabbit. The only thing missing from Taylor's performance was his throwing of confetti, which he couldn't resist doing during an insipid curtain call speech calling attention to his own theatrical inadequacies.

Rip Taylor is a masterful one-liner comedian. He is hysterical in solo, but has no conception of what to do in a "book" show. Neither is he cognizant of what ensemble playing entails. Perhaps I expected too much from this veteran of show business but his gross deficiencies were obvious to all. The fight scene between Captain Hook and Peter Pan was the most atrocious example. Ten year olds could have made it look more believable.

Now that the negative is off my pained chest, those who saw *Peter Pan* shall never forget it. Technically it was

one of the most spectacular productions seen at Clowes Hall. To create those magical effects must have been a technician's nightmare. It was a very special delight to the audience.

I was informed it took over thirty crew members to make this show majestically appear. The efforts involved must have been enormous because the results were awesome. The special visual effects really made the evening.

The travelling sets were beautifully ornate, lavish, huge, practical, and naturally very impressive. The exquisite costuming added as well as the complicated and unique lighting. And what can be said for the expert handling of the flying sequences which popped everyone's eyes.

Another delight was the precision dancing. Quite a lot of the original production (which was conceived, directed and choreographed by Jerome Robbins) was retained.

Outstanding performances were from Karyn Cole in the title role, Ann Marie Lee as Wendy, and Evelyn Ante as Tiger Lily.

Sadly this is the last show of the Broadway Series with no prospects of the series returning next year. What a loss to Indianapolis.
